# A Year of Celebration

In 2024, St. George's gathered for a year of celebration honoring the people who founded this congregation and cared for it faithfully for 75 years. On this anniversary, we honored founding members and past wardens, welcomed back eight clergy for a preaching series, revisited our shared history through a special installation in the Bradford Gallery, and came together for music and fellowship with



the 75th Anniversary Concert and Rhythm & Roots event. Together we remembered that the people of St. George's are a family rooted in Christ, growing through generations.

These shared values extended to the vestry as their commissions were restructured to better address the needs of this growing community. The Welcoming Commission continued the work of reaching people new to St. George's, and the Fellowship Commission created opportunities for people to engage with ministries and one other. The newly named Friendship Commission began the work of building a culture of closeknit friendships among individuals and within small groups. Together, these commissions foster a place for people to thrive in Christian community.

The report that follows shares a number of vital statistics which reflect the ongoing health and vitality of St. George's, including growth in Sunday worship attendance, the most successful Annual Campaign to date, and a continued emphasis on supporting our outreach partners.

### Areas of Growth

- Essentials Small Groups engaged 327 people around Scripture with new studies on the book of Exodus and our topical series, Being the Church.
- Pathways Kitchen received a 2024 grant awarded through St. George's Enterprise Ministry (SGEM). Through their restaurant and award-winning training program, they transform young lives by equipping our community's justice-involved youth with skills and opportunities to thrive.
- Parishioners gave generously toward special collections in response to Middle Tennessee tornadoes and Hurricane Helene.
- The first program of the Lenten Dinners & Conversation series was offered in partnership with The Rabbit Room, bringing 400 individuals to St. George's for a free event presented by Christian songwriter Andrew Peterson.
- St. George's Church and Kindergarten continued to partner by bringing in guest speakers on critical topics related to parenting. In 2024, we welcomed David Zahl of Mockingbird Ministries.
- Vacation Bible School taught 99 campers about Diving Deep into friendship with God—our largest VBS to date.
- St. George's continues to invest in the intentional formation of young adults through our Duke Divinity summer internship and partnership with the Nashville Fellows Program.
- Pastoral Care offerings were expanded with a new monthly healing prayer service as well as new support groups for those experiencing or caring for loved ones with a life-changing diagnosis.
- The *In Excelsis* Concert Series experienced record impact with 735 attendees for a VOCES8 concert in the fall, drawing people from across the country.
- Church-wide Mission Days created opportunities to volunteer with 18 unique projects serving people all across our city.
- The 2024 Christmas offering was larger than ever, with more than \$43,000 collected for B.E. Academy and The Cookery.

### Parish Statistics

Membership in this community continues to have steady growth as new people are baptized, confirmed, and received. Our welcome dinner and program for new members, called St. George's 101, serves as an additional way for new members to formally join the church. The class continues to be a formative connection point at St. George's, with a 10% increase in new members as compared to 2023.




New Christmas Eve Service at 10:00am

### Worship Attendance


Last year St. George's surpassed pre-pandemic Sunday attendance levels. Our in-person Average Sunday Attendance was 799, with an additional 45 people worshiping online each Sunday. This represents 11% growth for our in-person Sunday attendance.

Of special note in 2024 was the opportunity to host Presiding Bishop Michael Curry for a Saturday morning Eucharist in September. The continued popularity of the annual 3:00pm service on Christmas Eve drove the addition of a similar service last year. The new 10:00am service with children's homily and festive brass music exceeded expectations with more than 500 people in attendance. The result was the opportunity to welcome an additional 300 worshipers for Christmas services—a 13% increase in attendance for that special day of the church year.



### Annual Campaign

We began the 2024 Annual Campaign with excitement and enthusiasm for the coming year of ministry. The goal of \$4.25 million was met and exceeded by \$75,000 thanks to the work of our campaign co-chairs, Paige & Henry Menge and Kim Patikas, along with their committee of more than 60 parishioners. St. George's members continue to give generously, though opportunities exist for growth in the number of families making an annual pledge. We thank our co-chairs and volunteers for leading us in our most successful campaign to date, preparing St. George's for an engaging year of celebration during our 75th anniversary.



#### Financials

Our 2024 receipts totaled just over \$5,616,000, including money received from pledges, unpledged gifts, and endowment funds. We offer thanks to members of the Finance Committee who helped ensure prayerful and responsible use of gifts made to the church: Shannon LeRoy (Treasurer), Hudson Walker (Junior Warden), Jonathan Morphett (Vestry Representative), Jim Ezzell, Allison King, Francie Logan, Peggy Craig, Morgan Hillenmeyer, and Porter Meadors.

The largest piece of our budget was Outreach and Mission, representing \$985,000. Those funds were distributed among 34 outreach grant recipients as well as diocesan support for their ministries and smaller churches. In addition, we continued to fund our partners through St. George's Enterprise Ministry (SGEM), and collected special offerings for Hurricane Helene relief, Nashville tornado relief, B.E. Academy, and The Cookery.



### Endowment

In 2024, St. George's endowment received gifts from William H. & Eugenia H. Cammack, the Rev. Fred & Kathryn Dettwiller, Brandon & Mary Jackson, Dr. Eugene Harris Nelson, and Mr. O.B. Thomason. Their generous contributions, as well as all previous contributions, allow the endowment to serve the church in four broad categories:

- I. Emergency Funding after a natural disaster or crisis;
- 2. Building for St. George's Future such as leadership gifts toward capital projects;
- 3. Investing in Ministry by attracting highly talented clergy and helping them secure housing in a competitive market; and
- 4. Supporting Annual Operations with a gift of approximately 3% of the fund's balance, which prevents a cash flow shortage during months when giving is low.
