CHRISTMAS OFFERING

Following our annual tradition to support our neighbors at Christmastime, St. George's Vestry has approved the disbursement of this year's Christmas offering for two initiatives responding to critical needs in our community: **The Cookery** and **B.E. Academy for Girls.** Each organization supports the dignity of others with generosity and care. The Cookery, a division of Lambscroft Ministries, is a café, caterer, and event space that employs, houses, and trains men in culinary arts with the hopes of breaking the cycle of addiction and poverty. B.E. Academy is an educational initiative through Olive Branch Church in southeast Nashville that provides safe and high-quality education to girls in grades six through eight, with a plan to add ninth grade in the fall of 2025.

NEW TESTAMENT Hebrews 1:1-4

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.

THE HOLY GOSPEL John 1:1-14

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. 


