THE LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT CANDLE



THE NICENE CREED



We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory.


And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

MUSIC NOTES

There are many musical choices for the First Sunday of Advent. *Steal away to Jesus* is a well-known African American spiritual that is perfectly suited as a response to our gospel reading today. It also has an interesting connection to Nashville as the song was popularized by the Jubilee Singers from the Fisk University. Interestingly the choral version we sing today is written by British composer Michael Tippett (1905-1998), who successfully captured the melody and character of this spiritual. *A Spotless Rose* by Herbert Howells (1892-1983) connects us with today's Old Testament reading, highlighting the "righteous Branch to spring up for David." You will hear the music weave in fluid motion, mimicking the branches growing out from the root. The piece is filled with beautiful harmonies which embody the signature musical language of the composer.

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Podcast | Sermons from St. George's





If you have a "T" switch that is compatible with audio induction systems on your hearing aids, you may switch it on to hear the service better.



Using a smartphone and headphones or a Bluetooth-enabled hearing device, you can tune into the service using AudioFetch. Connect to the Wi-Fi network called AudioFetchExpress,

then open the AudioFetch app to start listening.
