

Someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven.

What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

THE HOLY GOSPEL







MUSIC NOTE

The offertory anthem is written by Renaissance composer Christopher Tye (d. 1572). Composers from this time period are often called "Tudor composers," after the House of Tudor in England. The musical language of this era is one of the finest examples of English music—clear in text and subtle in expression. In *Give almes of thy goods*, gentle lyrical lines bring out the text with the different vocal parts mimicking one other to fluid continuous phrases, which is quite typical of the style of the Tudor period. The communion anthem, *The Beatitudes*, is a unique piece by contemporary composer Arvo Pärt (b. 1935). You may wonder, "Wait, weren't the Beatitudes from the gospel from last Sunday?" We intentionally planned to sing this anthem this Sunday because the gospel reading today is a continuation of that important teaching telling us how we as Christians should live our lives. This anthem sounds different from the type music we usually sing, and you are encouraged to listen in a different way. Instead of searching for a melody, listen how the text of the Beatitudes is presented with the serene musical tones, silences, and gentle dissonances.

If you have a "T" switch that is compatible with audio induction systems on your hearing aids, you may switch it on to hear the service better.



Using a smartphone and headphones or a Bluetooth-enabled hearing device, you can tune into the service using AudioFetch. Connect to the Wi-Fi network called AudioFetchExpress,

then open the AudioFetch app to start listening.
