

THE HOLY GOSPEL

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" 

By your will they were created and have their being.





MUSIC NOTE

If we believe by John Goss (1800-1890) is a direct response to our epistle reading for today. Composer of the well-known hymn tune "Praise, my soul, the King of heaven," Goss was also an editor of hymnals and psalters. This anthem shows a great sensitivity to the scripture reading, reflecting its tone through its lyrical melodies, dynamic swells, and beautiful harmonic lines. The setting of *Tantum ergo* for today's communion anthem includes two verses from the full Latin hymn *Pange lingua* written by St. Thomas Aquinas. This text is often used during communion services, and over the centuries, many composers put music to this text. Today's tuneful anthem was written by contemporary composer Jessica French, who recently has gained greater recognition nationally and internationally. Many notable choirs around the world have sung her music, including the BBC Singers and St. Thomas Choir in New York City. French uses a wonderful hymn-like tune, staying true to the text's origin. The choir and organ support the tune beautifully, which is invigorated at the end with an acrobatic descant by the sopranos.
