THE READING 1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

Just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.

Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts.





Risen Lord, be known to us in the breaking of the Bread.



MUSIC NOTE

Both of today's anthems are inspired by Isaiah 52:7, which mirrors the message of our gospel reading today. *How beautiful upon the mountains* (1880), by Anglican composer John Stainer (1840-1901), masterfully combines this text with beautiful lyricism. Stainer is known as an efficient composer, especially regarding tunefulness and compositional structure. You will hear the four sections of the choir sing the primary melody as a canon (i.e., the same melody sung simultaneously, but starting at different times), gradually building to a unified statement of "thy God reigneth" at the climactic point of the work. *How beauteous are their feet* (1923) by Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924) uses a text by Isaac Watts (1674-1748), known as the father of English hymns. Stanford's anthem, composed more than 40 years after Stainer's, is written in a mostly homophonic style with one section singing the melody while others provide harmonic support. In the exciting contrast between the anthems, you can hear the growth and development of the Anglican style during that time period.




"Forgive one another as God in Christ forgave you." (Ephesians 4:32b)
