





Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.



MUSIC NOTES

The story of how the anthem *Een so, Lord Jesus, quickly come* by American composer Paul Manz (1919-2009) came to be is a noted one in music circles. in 1953, Paul and his wife, Ruth, were struggling with the care of their critically ill young son. As Ruth was praying for the healing of their son, she paraphrased Revelation chapter 22. Paul then turned this beautiful text into equally beautiful music. The melodic lines are very attractive, and along with the lavish harmonies, they represent a sense of prayerful patience and joy, even during times of urgency. This anthem mirrors the theme today's reading from Revelation in which we are instructed to be alert for the coming of Jesus. The beloved text of *Let all mortal flesh keep silence* by Edward Bairstow (1874-1946) is particularly well-suited for Christ the King Sunday. The vivid imagery in Bairstow's musical setting is emphasized throughout the anthem with the use of text painting, where the music literally depicts the text. For example, the men sing of "mortal flesh" and "fear and trembling" quietly in a lower register to depict humanity's lowliness compared to God's majesty. The women then sing, "And lift itself above all earthly thought," with an ascending line. Later, the music builds to an exultant "Alleluia!" as a depiction of the choirs of angels. Listen carefully to the music as you follow the words to hear how Bairstow brings the text's meaning alive with his colorful musical language.

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
