THE HOLY GOSPEL Mark 10:17-31

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

As Jesus was setting out on a journey, a man ran up and knelt before him, and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said to him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; You shall not defraud; Honor your father and mother." He said to him, "Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth." Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED BCP, p. 358





Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

MUSIC NOTES

Carlo Gesualdo (1566-1613) is a well-known madrigal composer from Italy during the Renaissance period. Gesualdo's tragic personal behaviors sometimes overshadowed his brilliance as a composer. Known primarily for his secular compositions, little is known about Gesualdo's sacred works. However, he skillfully brings word-painting to the significant religious text in O vos omnes, which we offer today in response to Psalm 22. Gesualdo pairs the sorrowful and repentant text with shocking dissonances, using this unconventional musical language to depict raw emotion, calling for deep reflection upon the death and sacrifice of Jesus for us. "Adoramus Te" by Orlando di Lassus (1532-1594) uses the Stations of the Cross liturgy to express adoration to Jesus on the cross, which is beautiful reflection of today's from Hebrews. The music is soothing and lyrical — a prime example of the beautifully woven lines that were a specialty of composers of that time. You will hear the musical lines move independently and come together, creating a wonderful sense of structure, while simultaneously serving as a free-flowing expression of this poignant text.
