Mark 8:27-38

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" And they answered him, "John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered him, "You are the Messiah." And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him.

Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. 

MUSIC NOTES

The service music in today's bulletin was written especially for the parishioners of St. George's by Director of Music Ministries, Woosug Kang, to celebrate 75th Anniversary of our parish. *St. George's Mass* features tuneful music to support congregational singing. To hear our choral singing the new music, visit stgeorgesnashville.org/music for a link to YouTube. Our offertory anthem, "The heavens are telling," is a movement from Joseph Haydn's (1732-1809) majestic choral oratorio, *The Creation*. The text is from today's Psalm, and the music features a trio of soloists in dialogue with the choir. The energy of this piece comes from its classical rhythm, which gives great emphasis to the text and its meaning. *Here, O my Lord* is written by lesser-known composer Percy Whitlock (1903-1946). He studied with major English composers such as Charles Villiers Stanford and Ralph Vaughan Williams, and his music demonstrates great sensitivity in melodic and harmonic lines. In this anthem, he used these lines to draw attention to certain words, such as "weariness" in the first stanza. As the anthem nears its end, it "relaxes" and draws us to prepare our hearts to receive communion.


