Letter from Malone and Colin

ear Friends,

As we write to you, planning has been underway for quite some time to celebrate our 75th anniversary as St. George's Episcopal Church. Interwoven throughout our preparations exists the central question of the church in every age: "Who do you say that I am?" This is, of course, the question posed by Jesus to his disciples at Caesarea Philippi. Peter's answer is the word which we must speak, boldly and vitally, to each generation: "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God."

Churches must wrestle with this question or risk getting caught up in the latest organizational trends or other minutiae and forget the foundation of all things - Jesus Christ. 

WHAT IT MEANS TO BE THE CHURCH



FINDING OURSELVES IN CHRIST

"I am out with lanterns, looking for myself" (Emily Dickinson).

Then poet Emily Dickinson wrote this line, she wasn't attempting to be cryptic or metaphorical. She penned this in humor as she searched for lost possessions during a move. But what a line this is!

Psychologists and philosophers tell us that people spend most of their lives seeking and establishing their identity – looking for themselves in occupations, familial roles, altruism, and a myriad of other places. Certainly, one place we search lies in religion or spirituality.

In his letter to the Philippians, Paul reviews his earthly identity, "Circumcised the eighth day, of the nation of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; as to the Law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to the righteousness which is in the Law, found blameless."

Paul will go toe-to-toe with anyone regarding earthly identity. If we are looking for accomplished individuals, a "Who's Who" in Israel, Paul is absolutely in the running. He immediately pulls the rug out from under all of it. "But whatever things were gain to me, those things I have counted as loss for the sake of Christ."

It's apparent that as Paul was "out with lanterns looking for himself," he encountered someone that radically changed his perspective forever: Jesus Christ. This encounter with Jesus profoundly altered Paul's worldview and his understanding about himself. In his letters to various groups of believers or churches, he articulates that humanity has forgotten its identity. Our human identity is not found in our litany of earthly connections or achievements, but rather sourced in our maker.

One of Paul's favorite phrases within his writings describes this identity as being "in Christ." The expression "in Christ" has both a collective and an individual implication. It means that we are not only related to Jesus the Christ personally, but that we are also knit together with the messianic community he came to build: the church.

So then what is "the church?" Foundationally, the church is a people who have discovered, and continue to discover, that they are "in Christ." The church is a people who first and foremost, before anything else, before any other marker or distinction, identify as being "in Christ." This primacy of being "in Christ" stands out in something Paul wrote to the believers in Galatia, "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus."

The mission of Jesus was not to create the Christian religion, but to reveal and redeem the image and likeness of God in humanity. I cannot overstate the importance and significance of a faith community gathering together for worship, which we do frequently here at St. George's. A meaningful aspect of our identity as a church is our time together to worship, serve, and celebrate God, all of which flows from our identity of being "in Christ." In other words, our gathering doesn't create our identity as a church, our gathering is an outflowing or result of who we are "in Christ."


It then makes perfect sense that the primary mission of our clergy and staff centers upon proclaiming St. George's identity "in Christ." Everything else we might do regarding mission and service bubbles up from that understanding.

Finally, let me say a few words about how we have come to be "in Christ." John's gospel speaks several times about our origin in Christ coming from God – it was not our doing. "[We are the Children of God] born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God," and "The wind blows where it wishes and you hear its sound, but do not know where it comes from and where it is going; so is everyone who has been born of the Spirit" (John 1, 3).

While there is much more that can be said about this, my point is that the person and work of Jesus Christ provide the potency in our identity, not us. The reach of his saving embrace extends well beyond our limited sight and knowledge. His grace encompasses us as we are "out with lanterns, looking for ourselves." You belong. I belong. We belong. We are in Christ. We are the church.

Walk in Love is a fabulous go-to resource when you are scratching your head trying to answer questions about our Anglican/ Episcopal identity. This easy-to-read book addresses many topics including the common question: "Why are children are permitted to receive communion at a young age?" Or more pertinent to the question we are exploring in our Essentials groups this fall, "What is the church?"

Reading this book builds appreciation for the beauty of church, the Scriptures, and the historic prayers that have shaped Christians in the Anglican tradition. But it also allows up to deepen our faith and relationship with Jesus Christ. It draws the connection between what we do and say in church with our lived-out intent to participate in God's redeeming work.

LEARNING HOW TO LOVE

n his book The Holy Longing: The Search for a Christian Spirituality, Ronald Rolheiser opens his chapter on "Sustaining Ourselves in the Spiritual Life" with a short line from St. Augustine: "Knowledge alone cannot save us." When Augustine wrote this line, he was writing a commentary on his own life. At the age of twenty-five he converted to Christianity at an intellectual level. After years of experimenting with various philosophies and ways of life, he became intellectually convinced that Christianity was true. But he was not a willing convert with his whole self. It took nine years for a real conversion to occur - the conversion of his heart. You see, for those nine years, Augustine was unable to give his heart to God. He saw the truth of the gospel with his mind, but he could not bring his life into harmony with his intellectual faith. What he eventually learned, and what the above quote points to, is that real faith in God is ultimately a question of falling in love. Knowledge is necessary for this to happen, but it is not sufficient. Faith is falling in love with God and allowing this love to have its way in our lives.

We often assume that we know how to love. The truth is, learning how to love is one of the great achievements in life. Love is first learned in the nuclear family. From our earliest moments, we absorb the nuances of affection, care, and intimacy from our parents. Babies learn trust and security through consistent nurturing, forming foundational bonds that shape their understanding of love. These experiences imprint patterns of attachment that influence how individuals approach relationships throughout life. Whether through physical gestures, soothing words, or the provision of basic needs, familial love teaches us the essence of empathy

and connection. Sibling interactions refine these skills, fostering negotiation and conflict resolution. And then we further our skills through friendship. As we grow, friendships offer a space for exploring different facets of love outside of familial ties — loyalty, companionship, and understanding.

And yet, despite all the ways our family and friends teach us how to love, there is no greater teacher than the church. Jesus teaches and models for us what true love looks like. And in the church, we practice the way of Jesus with others who have committed to follow Jesus' path. We practice forgiveness, we receive help from others, we sacrifice for the sake of the community – all acts of love. What's more, as we enter into loving relationships with our brothers and sisters in Christ, we discover at the same time that we are entering into loving relationship with God. In a mysterious way, learning to love the person next to us in the pew gives us a deeper capacity to love the God whom we cannot see. In this way the community of the church helps us to participate in the life of faith – falling in love with God and inviting God's love to transform our lives.

Elizabeth O'Connor puts it this way:

"The vows that we make when we become members of the church of Jesus Christ are more than an oath to stick around with a particular group of people. I believe that they can be interpreted as a commitment to a total inner transformation. This transformation which takes place as we try to live out our lives with those who are also called to be on the same inward path is simply learning to live by love — learning to be persons in community with other persons. This is the most creative and difficult work to which any of us will ever be called. There is no higher achievement in all the world than to be a person in community, and this is the call of every Christian. We are to be builders of liberating communities that free love in us and free love in others."

I share O'Connor's quote at every newcomer gathering because I believe it captures what we are up to at St. George's. For seventy-five years, St. George's has been a witness to the Christian faith in Nashville. We have been sharing the apostolic faith through our preaching and teaching. We have been celebrating the great sacraments of God. But more importantly, we have been helping men and women learn how to love – to love one another and to love God in Christ. As O'Connor puts it, we have been a liberating community, freeing love in us and freeing love in others. May God continue to bless our ministries for the next 75 years as we seek to bring others into a loving relationship with God, allowing this love to have its way in each of our lives.


